# Chrysanthemum

The chrysanthemum is the traditional flower for


Mother's Day. Perhaps

As a result there is now a wide variety of flower colours and shapes (single, semi-double and fully double) available on the market.

If you want to stick with tradition then you can get mum a lovely bunch of 'Mums' from your local florist. For something that's a little longer lasting you can opt for a chrysanthemum in a pot. These are a more compact form than the garden variety and give great indoor colour.

# Daphne

Daphne is one of the most popular fragrant plants and flowers in winter when very little else is happening in the

garden. Apart from the traditional pink flowered form, there is also a white flowered form. There is a new cultivar to the market called 'Eternal Fragrance' which is a repeat flowering form that can tolerate a sunnier spot in the garden.
